# **Big Hearts: UICCU Invests in Kids**

Time: Early 1980s. Place: Iowa City. Heroin: Jean Knepper.

"I happened to see that there was a Bowl For Kids' Sake," said Knepper, now the 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President & Director of Community Relations for the University of Iowa Community Credit Union (UICCU). "We did not get a flyer or anything like that. So I called and I said, 'We'd like to put together a team."

With just a phone call, the first domino fell. Then 10 or 12 more, as that's how many UICCU colleagues bowled that year. They had a great time, striving for strikes together and helping local kids. That led Knepper to become a BBBS Board Member. That sparked UICCU to maintain an unbroken presence on the BBBS Board that continues to this day. And over the 30+ years since Knepper's phone call, UICCU's Johnson County bowlers have grown from 10 to 138. They made up 23 teams in 2017, and collectively raised over \$36,000 to create and

local youth. That includes a \$5,000 donation as the title sponsor for Bowl For Kids' Sake's; a gift the company is giving again in 2018.

"The Credit Union does a lot of good things in the community," Knepper said. "But if we were to be title sponsor for any particular event, in all of the markets we serve, that would be the Bowl For Kids' Sakes."

UICCU's support for local communities extends far beyond one event. In 2016, the last year for which data is readily available, Knepper says UICCU donated \$1.16 million to community initiatives, and invested 4,125 volunteer hours. Some of those hours were invested by incoming Board Member Robbie Deckard, a 2nd-year mentor for his 5th-grade Little Brother, Luke.

"That comes back to the Credit Union encouraging you to get involved with the community," Deckard said. "Often times, when other people ask about it I say,

making a difference in somebody's life. Not only is he making a difference in mine – it goes both ways. I have really enjoyed that opportunity."

Deckard is in his 5<sup>th</sup> year supporting Bowl For Kids' Sake. His 2017 team raised half of their funds via a branch bake sale each Friday of February, rotating responsibilities each week for baking. Other UICCU teams have hosted freewill donation lunches, or longest golf drive contests.

Knepper said senior leadership from enthusiasts like Steve Quigley, former BBBS Board Member, and Jeff Disterhoft, UICCU CEO, has been essential. In 2017, their Team UICCU squad was the top-grossing team from *any* company *or* organization within Johnson County. Both Knepper and Deckard say a healthy competition is part of the fun and reason for success.

"For those staff that work in other branches, to say, 'Well we can do this in our market too!' And, 'We can make this a fun event!' I think that's probably the key to it," Knepper said. "Realizing how much fun it is. It can be contagious."

Deckard adds it helps to remember the purpose behind fundraising. He sees that purpose every time he and Luke share laughs going bowling, playing laser tag, or at the Children's Museum (free for Bigs and Littles together with their BBBS card). "The monies that are raised go towards creating those matches — ultimately, that's how the matches are created," Deckard said. "Without those dollars raised, it keeps that Little from potentially having a Big."

"It's money well spent," Knepper added. "A big part of it is we really believe that Big Brothers Big Sisters organization of Johnson County does a good job making sure that the way the funds come in, that they're spent very wisely. And that it's an investment."

Deckard said it's extremely exciting when his BFKS team hits its goal:

"When we get the final numbers at the end, being able to say this is how much money we raised for the kids; that's the best part of it for me."

# Resource Corner: Alcohol Abuse Prevention By lill Kromming Secondary School Resed St.

Grown-ups, particularly the highly significant ones like parents and mentors, influence how kids think about alcohol consumption. Since alcohol consumption is prevalent in our culture we often get opportunities to share our views, or at least have a reaction to drinking.

For example, what is your response if you see someone who is obviously inebriated? Do you laugh? Do you judge them negatively? Do you laugh at stories of "funny" things someone did when they were intoxicated?

What is your answer to the question: Is it bad to drink? What happens when somebody is drunk? Can you die from drinking too much?

What makes someone an alcoholic?

If you want some help sorting out your own views about alcohol consumption and its consequences AND desire some facts, check out the website for the National Institute of Health (NIH) at <a href="https://niaaa.nih.gov/">https://niaaa.nih.gov/</a>. You'll find a survey to help determine if alcohol is a problem for you (or how much of a problem; it is a continuum) as well as places to get help. An estimated 17 million U.S. adults have alcohol disorders.

The NIH webpage also has a section specifically for teens that is fun and helpful. Big Brothers Big Sisters of Johnson County has been the grateful participant/recipient of a grant from the Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH). This grant primarily funds our Secondary School Based Mentoring Program, our in-school mentoring program for junior high and early high school students. Drug abuse/misuse prevention is one of the goals of this grant. Thank you, IDPH!


